We're excited to announce the real start of Monday Night Lessons!

BEFORE YOU ARRIVE:

- Please sign up each week to attend! Please include the names of all members/grown-ups/leaders/siblings attending-- and horses! <u>The link to the sign-up document</u> is here!
- IMPORTANT If you are not a JCHP member, or a 4H leader, you are considered a "non-JCHP spectator" (eg moms/dads/grandparents/non-4H siblings or friends) and must sign this waiver required by our insurance. You can print it at home and bring it to MNL, or grab a copy at the check-in desk. Waiver Form

PLEASE BRING:

- \$3 per rider
- Coggins (a copy for us to keep--only need to bring once)
- Helmet, long pants, boots with cut out heel
- A healthy horse (come anyway even if you don't have a horse to bring!)
- Please DO NOT BRING your horse to Fair Park if you have ANY concerns about your horse's wellness.
 Specifically, do not bring your horse if he/she has a fever, or a thick discharge from either/both nostrils, or has any other medical concerns not yet seen by a vet. If in doubt, don't bring your horse! There will always be activities and educational opportunities at each MNL for those who CAN bring their horses and those who CANNOT.
- If you bring a horse who appears to be sick we will ask you to leave in order to protect all the other horses.

Arrival and Check-in at Fair Park: 6pm-6:30pm Leave your horse in the trailer and check-in by the Announcer's Stand (or just inside the indoor arena if the weather is bad). EVERYONE needs to check-in, and you will need to pay your \$3 and show your Coggins and helmet if you will be riding. Non-JCHP Spectators need a signed waiver (see above). Once you have checked in, you can unload your horse and as soon as you are ready, you may begin to lunge/warm-up/ride in the arenas (remember - you cannot be mounted unless you are in an arena or just about to enter).

Lesson time: 6:30-8pm with possible extended open ride depending on weather and participants.

Meat Animal 4-H Project Requirement:

All 4-H'ers who participate in the beef, sheep or swine projects will need to complete a point card in order to meet requirements to be a member of good standing. Youth will not be permitted to exhibit at the Jefferson County Fair without meeting these requirements. The point card requirements are that all 4-H'ers (except 13th graders) must complete four points in a 4-H year. They are:

- YQCA
- · Carcass Educational Meeting
- Record Book (This requirement will be effective for the 2022-23 4-H year.)
- 1 additional educational point

(Note: For this year, youth need 3 points because the record book is not required for the point card due on May 27, 2022.)

Science Activities

It was hard to celebrate Earth Day and Arbor Day in April's roll-a-coaster weather. Spring is now appearing and Nature is popping. So let's do our celebrating and acknowledge Earth Day and Arbor Day with some Natural Science activities.

Dorothy Carnes Park offers a great opportunity to explore and gain information for Natural Science projects. You can have an adventure, watch for wildlife, ID prairie flowers or see how plants and animals live together. Bring a picnic lunch and come enjoy the birding activities and the ecosystems scavenger hunt on May 7th.

Birding Activities are planned for Saturday, May 7. Meet at 11 am for an hour of bird watching, listening and ID. This is open to all 4-H members. Come and enjoy!

Or you can visit Dorothy Carnes Park anytime during the day to **Celebrate International Migratory Bird Day** with the Friends of Rose Lake. They will be holding a **Dawn to Dusk Birding Sit-In**. Everyone is welcome to take part any time during the day for as long as you would like. Take a snack or drink if you choose. It will be held **on the deck on the park's west side**. It the past years 60 to 70 species of birds have been heard or seen at the Birding Sit-In. This event is a great opportunity to observe a wide variety of birds with help of other birders. **Spring migration** will be in full swing as birds come back **to Wisconsin or** passing through going on **north**.

Explore Ecosystems at 1pm, while at the Park. Do a scavenger hunt as you hike one of the trails watching for the spring flowers or looking for animals in tree tops or in the undergrowth. Bring a pair of binoculars, your camera, note pad and pencil to list what you see and capture with pictures. Record details for the Natural Science project you enjoy and choose to tell others about.

Rose Lake is the lake within the park. It provides water, giving support to the migrating birds and homes to others. Amphibians and other wildlife call it home too. The lake is surrounded by plant and animal ecosystems making it a special Jefferson County park. The Scavenger Hunt information will also be available from members of Rose Lake Friends.

Plants & Soils Project

Projects include Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, House plants and Plant Crafts.

Thursday, May 26, <u>6pm</u> at Extension Office. Planting and Exhibiting Vegetables and Flowers --RSVP by May 22

In the plant meetings you have discussed the plants you like and learned what they need to be healthy. You learn about garden seeds that do best with the Wisconsin growing season. You made a list of vegetables to grow and planned to purchase the seeds. Now it's time to plant those seeds in the garden and the seedlings you have been growing or purchasing.

For early harvesting or if you plan to exhibit vegetables or flowers at the Fair, you will need to count the days until Fair and plan to give them growing time. You also need to consider the weather and soil conditions. Will it frost and is the soil warm enough for seeds to start growing. Review the A1653 Planting Guide or download A1989 The Vegetable Garden by Harrison.

Help tender plants acclimate to the weather. Use "hot caps" or covers for them. You can make covers from large soda bottles or milk jugs. Cut the bottom off the bottle or jug and remove the lid. You can place these over the plants to protect them from frost or wind. Remove them on very warm/ hot days. Replace at night. So the plants don't get cooked from the heat of the day but stay warm at night. Use a "row cover" for new plants growing from seeds you planted. Check out row covers and how and when to use them. They may help you have a successful garden.

Plant healthy plants. Use **clean tools** and **limit fertilizer** to seedlings until several true leaves have developed. New plants

are tender and need careful handling. Watch their growth for or egg production without owning the animal. damping off. **Damping-Off** is a common disease of seedlings where stems are affected by fungi causing stems to rot and not able to support the seedling. They are fungus or mold that thrive in cool, wet conditions. Don't over water and have good drainage. Also keep the seedlings at a warm temperature. Before planting seeds outdoors, wait until garden soil has reached the **best temperature** for germination. That temperature varies depending on the plant. Mature plants can also be affected with crown rot. The University of Wisconsin Garden Facts XHT1124 (Damping-Off), is a good resource.

When we_purchase plants, we need to know what the plant is supposed to look like. Look them over and be choosy. **Inspect the plant** carefully for signs of bugs, slugs or disease. Look on both sides of the leaves. Also examine the roots. Buy healthy plants.

Remember the importance of **plant rotation** of our garden vegetables. Use your garden plan/map. The University of Wisconsin Garden Facts XHT1210 Using Crop Rotation in the Home Vegetable Garden has helpful information.

Review A3382 Containers, and A3383 Mulches for Home Gardens and Plantings.

If you are considering exhibiting, plan ahead. The Fair Book is online at www.jcfairpark.com Look at and print a copy of Dept 14 &15 rules and entries. Mark the entries you will do. The deadline is June 1st for completing your entries on line. Print a copy of your entries so you can check them to be correct and can refer to them when taking them in for judging in July.

There are **changes** for exhibiting this year. Updates are being made and a informational meeting is schedule. Watch the Weekly Clover Connection for that information and check the April 2022 InFAIRmation Update 4.22.2022 from the Jefferson County Fair

Keep A2935 Evaluating & Judging Flowers & Indoor Plants and A3306 Exhibiting & Judging Vegetables handy to use for information for good growing practices and exhibiting fair entries. Make a card for each entry, listing the details for that entry and use the card as you prepare your exhibit. Take it to the Fair with you for a reference as you talk to the judge. Note rule #5 under Dept 15 asks for a note card identifying plants and flowers being exhibited.

- -Poultry is for youth exploring non-market birds such as ducks, bantams, geese, or turkeys.
- -Poultry Market is for youth exploring market birds such as chickens, ducks, geese, or turkeys.
- -Poultry Non-Animal is designed to learn about poultry science
