Youth may apply for multiple projects, but are only eligible to be awarded one project grant annually. The number of project grants awarded will depend on available funds. Individually, Hanna Brattlie placed 4th, Gabe Mindemann placed 5th, Megan Doherty placed 6th, Rylee Brattlie placed 7th, Elliott Small placed 8th, and Aiden Mindemann placed 9th.

The junior team of Gracelynn Dolph, Keilah Reu, Gavin Boettcher, and Haylie Reu placed first in the junior division. The junior team of Fynnley Gefvert, Greylen Boettcher, Pyper Gefvert placed third. Individually, Gracelynn Dolph placed 1st, Keilah Reu placed 2nd, Gavin Boettcher placed 4th, Haylie Reu placed 5th, Fynnley Gefvert placed 8th. All of the teams will advance to the state 4-H Livestock judging contest on July 24.

Clover Award

Anyone in 4-H can apply and receive a Clover Award just by participating! The Clover Award program recognizes 4-H members for the things they do in 4-H. By participating in activities members earn points towards five levels of recognition. If you are doing things in 4-H start filling out your Clover Award today! You can earn a Clover Award in one year, or it may take a couple of years. The more active you are the easier it is to get points. Check out the easy to complete application by clicking here - Clover Award Application. Applications are due September 1st.

Project Award

Apply for a Project Award! You may apply for up to 3 project awards per year. Please continue to use whatever method you want to show your growth and leadership in a particular project area. You can make a video, do a scrapbook, write a speech, make a display or be as creative as you want. Project Awards are separate from Record Book Awards. Project Award Applications are due September 1st.

Officer Books

Club officers - Treasurer, Secretary, Reporter/Historian are encouraged to keep a record book throughout the year of the club's happenings. Sample books are available at the EXT Office or on the website. They are due to the EXT office by September 1st.

Key Award

The 4-H Key Award is intended to be the top honor a county can give to any 4-H member. The Wisconsin 4-H Key Award recognizes 4-H participants who have demonstrated consistent growth in their 4-H involvement, developed and applied their leadership skills, and actively participated in the functions of their 4-H club and community. Older 4-H members are encouraged to apply for the 4-H key award. The application is based on participation in activities, an essay showing how 4-H has helped you to gain life skills and the completion of a leadership project. If you are interested in applying or at least starting the application process please contact the Extension Office. Key Award applications are due September 1st.

Record Book Award

Every 4-H member is highly encouraged to complete their year with a Record Book. Please check with your club, as some clubs have a Record Book requirement. Youth wishing to participate in the Record Book Award must have their Record Book turned in to the EXT Office by September 1st. The 2nd H in the 4-H Pledge is about pledging our hands to service. 4-H clubs (and members) who complete Community Service events in the name of 4-H should be honored for the things they do. Each club should complete the "My Hands to Larger Service" log to record the things that club members and your club as a whole do throughout the year. The clubs with the highest percentage of involvement will receive a monetary award. Each club who completes the log will be honored for their service. for Dept 16. Read the general rules and any special ones listed for the Divisions. Locate and highlight the specific information you need to know for exhibiting at the fair. Be sure you are presenting the items or information listed for the Class number you signed up to exhibit.

Enjoy the summer and take pictures and make notes of all the things you enjoy. Take time to sit and watch the birds and bugs as you have a snack . Listen for the wind in the leaves of the trees or smell the campfire at night when camping. Maybe just **feel** the tree bark with your fingertips. Or just lay in the grass and watch the clouds go floating by. Make up a poem about what you see. Enjoy your backyard or beyond with friends or on vacation.

Plants & Soils Project

Plant & Soils Projects include these project areas - Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, Houseplants and Plant Crafts.

Exhibit what you have enjoyed Growing and Enjoy sharing them with others.

Hopefully your house plants are growing well and you have figured how to plant some garden even with our crazy spring. Enjoy them and prepare them for your Fair exhibit. Keep a close eye on them! Watch for tine aphids or leaf miners that damage the plant leaves. Protect them, the best you can, from weather and insect damage. (tip-try using row cover materials or sturdy containers/covers in case of storms). Water carefully and oftener during our dry and hot days.

For those exhibiting at the county fair, the Judging schedule listed, Tuesday, July 11, 1-4pm for Plants & Soils-Dept #14 and Flowers & House Plants -Dept 15.

All Cloverbuds-Future Exhibitors - Double Check for any Judging Schedule changes on the Fair Park Website. Copy it and post it where you can see it.

Double check what you signed up to exhibit. If you have not printed the pages from the Fair Book for Dept 14 Plant & Soil Sciences and Dept 15 Flowers. I encourage you to do so. Mark and Read Carefully how to prepare each of your entries. Make a card for each entry, listing the details for that entry and use it as you prepare your exhibit. Take it to the Fair with you for a reference as you talk to the judge.

Note rule #6 under Dept 15 asks for a note card identifying plants and flowers being exhibited. Make a copy from the Fair Book and have it with your exhibit or take the information with you and fill one out when you check in your exhibit.. If you need help you may contact Sharon. (see below)

Also use <u>A2935 Evaluating & Judging Flowers & Indoor Plants</u> and <u>A3306 Exhibiting & Judging Vegetables.</u>as a guide for preparing your exhibit.

Most of all, Enjoy your plants and gardening with your family. May you have wonderful fresh vegetables for snacks and dinners. For continued fresh vegetables, you may want to try some successive planting or do some companion planting for late summer, early fall fresh vegetables.

Companion Planting with Bush Beans may be a gardening experiment that would be interesting to do.

Compact bush beans provide plenty of creative companion planting options in any type of garden. In intensive raised bed gardens, you might anchor the ends of double rows of bush snap beans or filet beans with summer savory or upright dill plants, two herbs often paired with green beans in the kitchen.

Or, try this companion planting idea intended to protect beans from pests. Plant bush beans after spring radishes, cilantro or arugula, with a few of the bolting plants left behind. Radish, cilantro and arugula flowers attract beneficial insects, and can help to confuse pests in search of beans. You can also interplant bush beans with onions to deter pests from both crops.

Enjoy your house plants. **smell** your flowers and **munch** on your fresh garden vegetables.

Annual Financial Reports

All chartered 4-H Clubs and Groups that have a checking and/or savings account must complete an Annual Financial Report and submit it to the Extension Office no later than **September 1, 2023**. Failure to submit a completed Annual Financial Report and support documents by the **due date** could result in loss of tax exempt status, forfeiture of all financial assets and non-renewal of the **4-H Club or Group Charter**.

All 4-H Clubs and Groups must be chartered, be formally recognized as a committee of a chartered County 4-H Leader Organization or report directly to the 4-H Program Educator.

Requirements for a 4-H Club and chartered Groups are listed on the <u>Wisconsin 4-H Policies</u> webpage.

A 4-H Charter is given to a new 4-H Club or Group once all requirements are met. The successful completion of the Wisconsin 4-H Charter Application begins this process. 4-H Clubs and Groups newly applying to become a 4-H Club or Group should work with their local 4-H Program Educator to determine a completion date.

4-H Charters are renewed annually and will be granted upon successful completion of the Wisconsin 4-H Charter Application. The Wisconsin 4-H Charter Application deadline is **September 1, 2023** for returning 4-H Clubs and Groups

Failure to submit a completed Wisconsin 4-H Clubs & Groups Charter Application by the **due date** could result in the 4-H Club or Group being dissolved.


