Awards Banquet Program Cover Contest

Calling All 4-H member! Do you like to draw? Would you like your art work showcased at the countywide level? Here's your chance to help design the Program Cover for the upcoming 4-H Awards Banquet to be held on November 10th at the Fair Park! We are looking for hand-drawn (not digital) cover art that features our theme "Celebration of 4-H". All drawings should be 8 1/2 x 11 and must be submitted to the Leaders Board via the UWEX no later than September 15th. Winner will be selected at the September Board meeting.

Clover Award

Anyone in 4-H can apply and receive a Clover Award just by participating! The Clover Award program recognizes 4-H members for the things they do in 4-H. By participating in activities members earn points towards five levels of recognition. If you are doing things in 4-H start filling out your Clover Award today! You can earn a Clover Award in one year, or it may take a couple of years. The more active you are the easier it is to get points. Check out the easy to complete application by clicking here - Clover Award Application. Applications are due September 1st.

Project Award

Apply for a Project Award! You may apply for up to 3 project awards per year. Please continue to use whatever method you want to show your growth and leadership in a particular project area. You can make a video, do a scrapbook, write a speech, make a display or be as creative as you want. Project Awards are separate from Record Book Awards. Project Award Applications are due September 1st.

Officer Books

Officer Books Club officers - Treasurer, Secretary, Reporter/ Historian are encouraged to keep a record book throughout the year of the club's happenings. Sample books are available at the EXT Office or on the website. They are due to the EXT office by September 1st.

Key Award

The 4-H Key Award is intended to be the top honor a county can give to any 4-H member. The Wisconsin 4-H Key Award recognizes 4-H participants who have demonstrated consistent growth in their 4-H involvement, developed and applied their leadership skills, and actively participated in the functions of their 4-H club and community. Older 4-H members are encouraged to apply for the 4-H key award. The application is based on participation in activities, an essay showing how 4-H has helped you to gain life skills and the completion of a leadership project. If you are interested in applying or at least starting the application process please contact the Extension Office. Key Award applications are due September 1st.

Record Book Award

Every 4-H member is highly encouraged to complete their year with a Record Book. Please check with your club, as some clubs have a Record Book requirement. Youth wishing to participate in the Record Book Award must have their Record Book turned in to the EXT Office by September 1st.

4-H Community Servant Award "My Hands to Larger Service"

The 2nd H in the 4-H Pledge is about pledging our hands to service. 4-H clubs (and members) who complete Community Service events in the name of 4-H should be honored for the things they do. Each club should complete the "My Hands to Larger Service" log to record the things that club members and your club as a whole do throughout the year. The clubs with the highest percentage of involvement will receive a monetary award. Each club who completes the log will be honored for their service. Locate and highlight the specific information** you need to know for exhibiting at the fair. Be sure you are presenting the items or information listed for the Class number you signed up to exhibit.

Mark the Judging schedule for Natural Sciences -List the date and time on your calendar. **Double Check for** any Judging Schedule **changes** on the Fair Park Website.

Plant and Soils Projects include these project areas – Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, House plants and Plant Crafts.

It's Fair Time!

Did you sign up to exhibit? Or are you planning on attending the Fair to see and learn about the many different exhibits? Find one you would like to do next year.

For those exhibiting.

Watch your plants daily. Turn houseplant pots so plants grow straight, not leaning to one side reaching for light. Keep plants in a protected place, watch for bugs and water regularly.

Hopefully you are able to keep up with the stormy weather, protecting your garden plants. Changes to them can happen quickly. Protect them, the best you can, from weather and insect damage. (tip—try using row cover materials) Enjoy them and/or prepare some as a Fair exhibit.

Double check what you signed up to exhibit.

If you have not printed the pages from the Fair Book for Dept 14 Plant & Soil Sciences and Dept 15 Flowers. I encourage you to do so. Mark and Read Carefully how to prepare each of your entries. Make a card for each entry, listing the details for that entry and use it as you prepare your exhibit. Take it to the Fair with you for a reference as you talk to the judge. Also mark your calendar with the judging dates and times. Cloverbud members are the Future Exhibitors. See Dept 17 Future Exhibitors, Divisions K and L under Non-Animal Exhibits. Double check the Fair website for any changes.

To Do

Note rule #6 under Dept 15 asks for a note card identifying plants and flowers being exhibited. Make a copy from the Fair Book and have it with your exhibit or take the information with you and fill one out when you check in your exhibit.. If you need help you may contact Sharon. (see below)

Also use <u>A2935</u> Evaluating & Judging Flowers & Indoor Plants or <u>A3306</u> Exhibiting and Judging Vegetables as a guides for preparing your exhibit. Remember they are guides for preparing and not the details for our county exhibits. If you have not seen or printed them go to the website *learningstore.uwex.edu*. Choose view PDF and download the publication to save and/or print. Keep for a hands on references.

In August, Enjoy your plants and and harvesting from your garden with your family. You may want to experiment with successive planting or do some companion planting for late summer or fall

Compact bush beans provide plenty of creative companion planting options in any type of garden. In intensive raised bed gardens, you might anchor the ends of double rows of bush snap beans with summer savory or upright dill plants, two herbs often paired with green beans in the kitchen.

Or, try this companion planting idea intended to protect beans from pests. Plant bush beans after spring radishes, cilantro or arugula, with a few of the bolting plants left behind. Radish, cilantro and arugula flowers attract beneficial insects, and can help to confuse pests in search of beans. You can also inter plant bush beans with onions to deter pests from both crops.
