Shooting Sports

Shooting sports is a great life skill to learn at a young age. With 4-H shooting sports the kids will learn the basic fundamentals of safety, awareness, posture, eye dominance, accuracy vs consistent grouping and much more. We want the kids to enjoy shooting sports along with knowing the responsibilities there is to shooting this type of equipment. We have 3 age groups with shooting sports; Junior is 3rd-5th grade(8-11yrs). Intermediate is 6th-8th grade(12-15yrs). Senior is 9th-1 year after high school graduation(16-19yrs). We split our shooting sports season into 2 groups; Indoor and outdoor. Indoor we do only archery and outdoor we do 3D archery, air pistol, air rifle, .22lr pistol, .22lr rifle, shotgun (trap), and muzzleloader. Each discipline is \$5 for the season. Safety Meetings are required to have before shooting per 4-H nationally. Safety meetings and first practices can not be on the same day. But they will still be able to shoot if wanted.

Indoor dates:

Safety meeting/equipment check and to do some shooting on 1/5 and 1/7. Practices Sundays and/or Tuesdays 1/12 and 1/14 to 3/9 and 3/11. Each archer is required to have 3 practices to be eligible to participate in the County Competition. The County Competition will be 3/16, 3/18, 3/23, 3/25.

Outdoor dates

Outdoor shooting will start in April. There will be an email sent out as the time comes closer. Sundays; air rifle/pistol, shotgun, .22lr rifle. Mondays; 3D archery, .22lr pistol, muzzleloader.

Plant & Soils Science Project 2025 January Activities for Plant & Soils Sciences Projects

Plant and Soils Projects include these project areas – Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, House plants and Plant Crafts.

Winter, a time to gather information and plan what you would like to grow this year as a project . A new houseplant? Vegetables or flowers or both? Does your family grow crops? Will you be helping with the crops or have a plot of your own? Would you like to exhibit them at the county fair?

No place to grow a patch of corn or sunflowers? Ask for the possibility to

plant them at or with another club member at their home or farm.

Seed catalogs will be arriving in the mail. No catalogs, go to the websites of seed companies. Talk with your family and make a list of your choices. List plants or seeds that are interesting, or ones you would like to grow or to eat. Find vegetables or flowers with funny or strange names. Think about growing one of them.

It could be **fun** to grow some **"Easter Egg"** Radishes or **"Yin Yang"** Beans. Or plant some **Teddybear Sunflowers** or start some **Perennials** for Birds, Bees and Butterflies, the **Pollinators** we need. Maybe you would like some **Edible** flowers along with your vegetables. **Giant or tiny** vegetables might make an interesting fair exhibit.

2025 January Activities for Natural Science- all Natural Resources & Environmental Education Projects

Projects include Beekeeping, Birds, Insects, Fishing, Forestry, Wildflowers, Hunting & Wildlife, Adventures, and Environmental projects.

January Activity, Plan to attend! Hoo's Woods, Dianne Moller Presentation with live Raptors

January 25, 2025, 10am, Hoard Museum, Fort Atkinson, WI

This will be a wonderful program where you will be able to see and learn about an Eagle, a Snowy Owl and another rehabilitated raptor. There will handouts and a "Birding Basket". Gather information for a birding project and enjoy seeing great birds up close.

Each of Natural Science project area has a variety of possibilities. Which one are you interested in Do you like wildlife, wildflowers, or adventures?

Chose what you are interested in doing? List the one you want to learn more about. Plan an adventure activity or trip that is about fishing, camping, hiking or skiing. Make a survival or first aid kit for an adventure activity. Check listings for the items you will need and the kind of case to put them in. Create a walking stick for hiking or a poster showing how you would clean a fish. Create a "log" or poster/display with pictures and comments about your adventure experience or an environmental topic.

What winter activities do you enjoy? Making a Snow Fort, Skiing, sledding, snowmobiling? All these depend on the weather. Will we have snow? It is said our climate is changing. Illustrate weather conditions is an Environment project. You can make a weather instrument or weather calendar recording the weather conditions.

Take a winter walk or hike and observe what's around you. What trees do you see? Look for tracks or birds. Record your observations with pictures and notes, providing information for projects on Forestry, Wildlife and Birds. Or do observations at home. Put out a bird feeder and record how many different birds you can list. Watch for squirrels, look for his tracks in the snow. These enjoyable activities can be a part of Natural Science projects.

Practice winter safety, dress for your activity and keep your first aid kit with you at all times. Enjoy winter activities. Don't get cabin fever.

Check out more adventure ideas and information listed in the Wisconsin Natural Resources magazine at WNRMAG.COM . Also get idea from the Winter 2024 Issue on how they make snow, or going snowshoeing or Fat biking, or even camping. "Embrace Wisconsin winters no matter the weather" offers such ideas. Enjoy our Wisconsin Winter Time with an adventure to record as your 4-H project.

While thinking about all the animals and birds that can be seen and supported in winter, there are others needing consideration and support too. The cold blood critters, how do they adapt to freezing conditions. Where do frogs, mudpuppies, worms and fish spend their winters? Or all

the **insects?** They have a stories of their own. Check them out and plan to give them a helping hand through the winter.

2025 Agri-Business scholarship applications now available

Jefferson County Agri-Business Club provides college scholarships to local youth pursuing a career in agriculture. Students wanting to apply can download an application from the club website, www.jeffersoncountyagribusinessclub.com. The application includes student activities, leadership, work experience, transcript, essays about agriculture, and letter of recommendation. Students can be seniors in high school or currently enrolled in college. Monies are awarded to youth attending 2-year, 4-year, or technical schools. The deadline for submission is February 1, 2025.

Jones Dairy Farm donated all the ticket sales from their 2022 Jones Yellow Barn Centennial Celebration to the club's scholarship fund. "This donation allows our organization to assist more local students pursuing careers in agriculture by helping to fund their college educations," stated Bill Blossfeld, Jefferson County Agri-Business Club president. The top 2025 scholarship applicant will receive the Jones Dairy Farm Agriculture Scholarship.

In addition, memorial monies were donated to the Jefferson County Agri-Business Club in honor of retired Jefferson High School agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, Will Larson. He also managed the St. Coletta's farm in Jefferson. In recognition of his involvement in the Jefferson County Agri-Business Club, friends and family donated funds to start this special scholarship within the organization to which he dedicated many years. A scholarship bearing his name will be awarded to a student pursuing a degree in agricultural education with the goal of becoming an ag teacher.

The Grants/Scholarship committee reviews and scores the applications. They present their recommendations to membership at the February meeting for final approval. The


