MEMBERSHIP GOALS

All Livestock Project Members shall...

- 1. Prepare for citizenship responsibilities.
- 2. Develop desirable character traits.
- 3. Develop pride and responsibility associated with managing animals.
- 4. Receive training in the care, feeding, management and costs associated with animal production.
- 5. Practice sound livestock feeding and management practices.
- 6. Develop short and long term livestock project goals.
- 7. Understand and use sound marketing practices.
- 8. Gain appreciation of outdoor living and animal care as recreation.
- 9. Develop skill, patience and understanding in handling animals.
- 10. Learn and practice safety precautions for humans and animals.
- 11. Develop a clear understanding and appreciation of the livestock industry.
- 12. Understand the importance of animal products in human nutrition and develop a basic knowledge of production standards.

GENERAL RULES AND GUIDELINES

- 1. All participants must be current members of Jefferson County 4-H.
- 2. All members must be enrolled in one or more of the following projects: beef, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit, goat, llama/alpaca.
- 3. Project members must be a member in good standing.
- 4. 4-H project members must be in 3rd through 13th grades (no older than 19 by December 31st).
- 5. Immediate family is considered father, mother, brother, sister and/or those raising children in the immediate household.
- 6. All members must adhere to the code of conduct that was signed when enrolling in 4-H.

FIRST YEAR LIVESTOCK PROJECT MEMBERS

If you are a first-year livestock project member in any species, please reach out to your project representative(s) to gain valuable information about raising a livestock animal.

LIVESTOCK RECORD BOOK

- 1. There is one Livestock Record Book used for all species.
- 2. Livestock records run from September 1 through August 31 each year.
- 3. The Livestock Record Book must be completed manually and handed in by hard copy.
- 4. The Livestock Record Book must be completed by youth interested in obtaining project grants and awards.
- 5. The Livestock Record Book is due on September 1st
- 6. Please review your records before turning them in to ensure you have completed all the information.
- Livestock Record Books will be judged by the 4-H Educator and Livestock Committee. Please
 refer to the last page of the Livestock Record Book for the evaluation rubric that will show how
 you are judged.

Livestock Marketing Competition

The Livestock Marketing Competition gives youth real world experience in marketing their livestock project to prospective buyers. Youth can chose to do a presentation in one of three areas:

- 1) Livestock Genetics- Youth choose one animal to market to potential buyers. This can include embryos and semen. The focus is on the phenotype and genotype of your animal. Pedigrees and EPDs can be utilized during the presentation. A powerpoint, projected video or still image is required to showcase your animal.
- 2) Market Animal- Youth choose one animal to market to potential buyers. The focus is the carcass and finished product of your animal. Ultrasound data can be utilized during the presentation. A powerpoint, projected video or still image is required to showcase your animal.
- 3) Livestock Products- Youth may choose to market ANY product related to the project species of their choice. The products can be made by the youth or general products. For example a presentation can be on lamb meat- either specific to the youth or marketing the lamb industry.

Presentations: **Seniors** need to be a minimum of 4 minutes long, with a maximum of 6 minutes. **Intermediate** 3 to 5 minutes. **Juniors** 2 to four minutes. Points will be deducted at ½ point per judge for each 10 seconds over and under the allowed time span. Following the conclusion of the presentation the youth will be allowed up to 3 minutes to answer questions from the judges. Judges will not interrupt the presentation to ask questions. All questions will be asked at the conclusion of the presentation.

Points will be awarded as follows: Content - 10 points. Ability to communicate - 10 points. Organization - 10 points. Overall effect - 10 points. Knowledge & Response to Questions – 10 points

Up to five points will be deducted for dependence on notes for Seniors. Up to five bonus points will be given to Junior and Intermediates who do not depend on notes.

Livestock Project Goals & Planning

Your goal statements reflect something you aim to accomplish within your Animal Project. You may look at the whole project when considering goals; work to write goals that look at the industry and the product you are looking to produce.

Your goals should reflect something you want to accomplish or learn about. Without goals, it is almost impossible to move forward. Your goals can help measure your increased knowledge and skills about the Livestock industry.

How to Write a Goal:

Goals have four parts that can be measured or checked:

- 1) the action: how you are going to do it;
- 2) the result: what you will do:
- 3) the timetable: when you plan to have it done;
- 4) The reason: why you want to accomplish this goal or what do you want to learn.

For example, "I will train my 4-H market animal to lead before the initial weigh-in for ease of loading and to present my animal in the best condition for county fair."

- 1) "I will train" is the action portion of the goal.
- 2) The result "my 4-H market animal to lead,"
- 3) "before weigh-in and county fair" defines the timetable.
- 4) The reason "for the ease of loading...."

When writing goals it is also important to analyze the various resources that will be necessary to complete those goals. That is why we ask you to complete a goal table. The goal table allows you to have your goal on one side so that you can easily analyze it to see what you will need to complete that goal. Please see the below goal table for an example.

LIVESTOCK POINT CARD

**Livestock Point Card runs from September 1 through August 31. **

- 1. A livestock point card is a *required* document for all active 4-H Livestock Project members.
- 2. Livestock Point Cards are due to the Extension Office by August 31.
- 3. Refer to the Livestock Point Card for eligible opportunities and point values.
 - a. All 4-H members must earn the required points to be eligible for any awards
 - b. 4-H members can obtain points from any event, regardless of the species they exhibit.
 - c. Any event not listed on the point card that is an educational program created by a Land Grant University or 4-H program is pre-approved.
 - d. Any event not listed on the point card that is educational must be pre-approved by a committee member or the Extension office. Approval can be obtained by emailing Jerry Wilcenski, the 4-H Educator, at wilcenski@wisc.edu
- 4. Each completed event requires a signature or documentation.
 - a. Any Committee Member or the Extension office may sign the point card. (A parent signature or a youth signature will not be accepted.)
 - b. Additional acceptable forms of documentation include:
 - i. Show registration or entry forms.
 - ii. Show results.
 - iii. Photo of exhibitor identifying they were present at the event with supporting material. (schedule of events, show catalog, agenda of clinic, etc.)
 - iv. Any other form of documentation must be approved by a member of the committee or Extension office.

- 1. Documents are due to the Extension Office by August 31st along with the livestock point card and record book.
- 2. Each species will have its own documentation, the following are some general guidelines
 - a. All registered animals copy of registration papers of the dam and register offspring
 - b. Birth records birth/hatch date, birth weight, twin or single, litter size, ect. Species specific- you won't have a birth weight for chicks, but should for a calf.
 - c. Animal Id ear tag, ear notch, leg/ wing band, or tattoo information
 - d. Grades and crossbreds include as much information on the sire and dam as possible
 - e. Complete the Breeding Goals and Planning and turn in with all required documents

Your goal statements reflect something you aim to accomplish within your breeding project both long term and short term. Work to write goals that look at the industry and the product you are looking to produce.

Your goals should reflect the larger vision and standard of your breed. If crossbreeding, note the advantages the cross promises. Without goals, it is almost impossible to move forward with a breeding project.

How to Write a Goal:

- 1) the action: your pairing selection
- 2) The reason: why you made this cross

For example, "I will breed my New Zealand does to buck #19826 to increase my meat pen uniformity and improve loin shape."

- 1) "Breeding to buck #19826" is the action portion of the goal.
- 2) The reason "to increase uniformity and improve loin shape"

Evaluating Goals:

- 1) the result: what the offspring look like, growth rate, performance and other trait evaluations
- 2) the reflection: how well the cross worked, what are the next steps

For example, "I will breed my New Zealand does to buck #19826 to increase my meat pen uniformity and loin shape."

- 1) When selection for my meet pen took place, I had 8 rabbits at the same weight and the judge gave positive comments on how uniform the pen was- Is the result
- 2) The reflection The loin shape was better than previous litters, I am keeping four does and will be looking for a new buck to cross. I will also be doing the same cross on my doe herd again this year to increase the number of females of uniform type and improved quality.

The following awards are for eligible 4-H Livestock Project members. Awards will be given at the 4-H Livestock Awards Banquet held in the Fall of each year.

To be eligible and considered for the below awards, youth must complete all required points listed. In the case of a tie, there will be an in-person interview with the individual project member regarding their specific project.

- 1. **Outstanding Project Record Award:** The top three record books for each species will receive an award. First Place \$100; Second Place \$50; Third Place will receive \$20
- 2. **Young Breeder of the Year:** This award will be given to the top youth in the bred and owned livestock project in each species that earns the highest point total. Must submit the required documents and point card. A youth from each species will be awarded a prize valued up to \$75
- 3. **4-H Greenhorn Award:** A youth participating in a livestock project for the first time ever. Awarded to the first-year project member with the best record book and top point cards.
- 4. **4-H Limelight Award (Point Card):** There is no cap on the number of points a youth may earn. They must have fulfilled all required points. Youth will be rewarded for the effort that they put into their project(s).
 - a. The top five members in grades 8-12 will be eligible for a special trip to a major exhibition. We want to reward hard work and create self-motivation.
 - b. The top five members in grades 3-7 will be eligible for a special trip to a major exhibition if a parent or guardian accompanies them OR will be eligible for a fun day trip.
 - c. The overall top earning point members will receive a testimonial written by the 4-H youth educator about their achievements within the project that the youth may utilize when recruiting buyers for their animals or animal products. Request must be emailed to wilcenski@wisc.edu by June 1st
- 5. **Skill-a-Thon Award:** Youth will take a written evaluation in one or more species of their choice. Tests will include industry standards, breed identification, equipment identification and meat cut identification. Tests will be available to take in-person at the Jefferson County Fair. Specific information and dates and times will be communicated at a later time. The top score for each species in grades 3-5; 6-8 and 9-13 will receive a cash award of \$50.
- 6. **Livestock Marketing Awards**: The Livestock Marketing Competition gives youth real world experience in marketing their livestock project to prospective buyers as well as develop effective communication skills. The top score for each youth (regardless of species) grades 3-5; 6-8 and 9-13 will receive a cash award of \$100.
- 7. **4-H Exhibitor of the Year:** An award will be presented to one project member of each species.
 - a. Members must meet all exhibitor and animal project requirements to be eligible.
 - b. Members must participate in showmanship and complete the species Skill-A-Thon to be eligible.
 - c. Members must complete a species specific record book.
 - d. The 4-H Educator will obtain live class rankings and carcass rankings from the County Fair. No documentation needs to be submitted to be eligible.
 - e. Total evaluation for Beef, Sheep, Swine and Meat Goats includes:
 - i. Live Class Ranking at Jefferson County Fair (20%)

- ii. Carcass Ultrasound or Livestock Marketing Results (20%)
- iii. Live Showmanship Ranking at Jefferson County Fair (20%)
- iv. Individual Placing from Skill-A-Thon (20%)
- v. Record book placing (20%)
- vi. In the case of a tie, the tie will be broken in the following order: highest record book ranking, highest Skill-A-Thon ranking, highest carcass ranking, highest showmanship ranking, highest live show ranking.
- f. Total evaluation for Rabbits, Poultry and Dairy Goats includes:
 - vii. Live Class Ranking at Jefferson County Fair (20%)
 - viii. Live Showmanship Ranking at Jefferson County Fair (20%)
 - ix. Livestock Marketing Results (20%)
 - x. Individual Placing from Skill-A-Thon (20%)
 - xi. Record book placing (20%)
 - xii. In the case of a tie, the tie will be broken in the following order: highest record book ranking, highest Skill-A-Thon ranking, highest carcass ranking, highest showmanship ranking, highest live show ranking.

PREMISE IDENTIFICATION

Do You Have Animals? Have you registered your premises?

What is a Premise ID?

A premises identification number (PIN) or location identifier (LID) is a unique code that is permanently assigned to a single physical location.

What must be Registered?

Any location in Wisconsin where livestock are kept or congregated must be registered. Livestock includes:

- Cattle and other bovine animals
- Swine
- Poultry
- Sheep
- Goats
- Horses and other equine animals
- Farm-raised deer and other cervids
- Gamebirds including pheasants, quail, wild turkeys, migrating waterfowl, pigeons,
- and exotic birds raised in captivity
- Bison
- Llamas and other camelids
- Ratites such as emus and ostriches
- Fish

Premises includes:

- Farms and hobby farms
- Veterinary clinics with large animal hospital facilities
- Stables
- Animal markets
- Livestock feedlots, animal trucker and dealer premises where animals are kept
- Slaughter, rendering and dead animal plants
- Livestock exhibitions
- Any other location where livestock is kept or congregated

The premises registration number stays with the location; that is, a change in property ownership will not change the premises identification number.

If you have any of the above animals and you haven't registered your premises (location) within the past three years, registering your premises is free and fast, and it's mandatory in Wisconsin.
