#### **Natural Science Project**

Natural Science Projects include Beekeeping, Birds, Insects, Fishing, Forestry, Wildflowers, Hunting & Wildlife, Adventures, and Environmental projects.

As you see there are many things you can do as a natural science project. Each project area has a variety of possibilities. What are you interested in doing this 4-H year? Do you like wildlife, wildflowers, or adventures? What do you want to learn more about? Club Leaders, do you want ideas for a club meeting activity? For anyone who was hunting this fall, consider sharing your experience as a project under Hunting or Adventures. Create an exhibit as a booklet, poster or display of the hunting experience with a log of events and pictures. Or do a poster illustration the type of bow or gun that might have been used. A poster can also be made by anyone in Archery or Fire arms. Safety Rules is another area that can be shared with an exhibit.

In December, Project Activities can focus around Christmas. Decorate your trees or bushes for the birds.

Make Cone Bird Feeders by filling or covering Evergreen Cones with a peanut butter and birdseed mixture. Then hang them as ornaments in your trees or bushes for birds or other wildlife.

No tree. Create a tree with cut or fallen branches in front of a window where you can watch the feeders for visitors. You will want to see who comes to eat. Have a bird ID book handy and a notebook to record the visitors to your cone feeders. Watch for signs of visitors other than birds.

Create an exhibit by taking pictures and keeping a Nature Log by entering dates and details tell about making the cone feeders, when and where you placed them, and who comes to visit or eat at them. Pictures illustrate the details of the entries in your nature log (the recorded activities you did or saw).

Here are some other ornaments birds or small critters may like.

#### Make -

<u>Strings of popcorn</u>— but make sure that it's **all natural**; **no butter or salt added**.

**Create** <u>Cheerio bracelets</u> – An O circle - String together "Cheerios" in the shape of a bracelet circle to slide over the tips of branches.

<u>A String of pearls</u> can be made using a needle and thread to string together different kinds of grapes. You can also add raisins and cranberries.

**Hang out Apple and orange slices** - Thinly slice (1/4"-1/2") apples and oranges, string through a bit of thread in each, and hang each piece separately from branches.

December also is the time for the Christmas Bird Count.

The **Christmas Bird Count** is held each year by the National Audubon Society. The Friends of Rose Lake will hold a count here in Jefferson County on **December 14th**. You may join them for a great experience in observing birds and our county. It's always interesting to find out how many different birds are hanging around for Christmas. You can also **do your own count** at your bird feeders. Identify and count the birds at your feeder. Make a chart listing the birds, days, times, and weather. Contact Sharon for a bird list or find one on the Audubon or Cornell websites. The Christmas Ornaments and Christmas Bird Count are great as Bird project activities that can be shared as Fair entries. Take pictures, make notes and enjoy watching the birds. It's a surprising joy to see a bird others haven't!

<u>December</u> also brings thoughts of winter activities. The activities you do all the time, are Natural Science project activities. For example, taking a winter hike can be an adventure activity. Watching and Looking for tracks or signs of wildlife can be a wildlife project. Writing a winter poem or story about your hike or the birds at your feeder can be an exhibit.

Also creating a shelter area for small mammals, amphibians or insects. That would be part of a conservation project. Or are there too many of a species in your yard or local area? If so, What kind of management practices are good and when should they be used? These project areas or topics may be covered in other newsletters or with your request.

Christmas is a great time to add items to the gift lists that you could use or would like and use in doing a Natural Science Project. For example, add an ID book about birds, wildflowers, WI mammals. Or an extra backpack or a new sleeping bag for an adventure hike or camping trip.. Maybe a new fishing pole or a tip-up for ice fishing.

Enjoy the Holidays and the wonderful world we have around

us. Let's be Thankful for it, Enjoy it, and Care for it.

#### **Plant & Soil Science Project**

Include these project areas – Crops, Vegetables, Flowers, House Plants and Plant Crafts

December, Christmas and Winter are the seasons to learn about Evergreen trees and shrubs. Make a list of them, pine, spruce, etc. Watch for them in indoor and outdoor arrangements. Use any trimmed branches you may have in an arrangement of your own. Take pictures to record your arrangement and the steps making it. Use the pictures to create a poster as an exhibit showing your arrangement. The poster could be a project exhibit for fair.

Poinsettias are the main Christmas flower. Research their growing requirements and the hybrid variation. Other Christmas plants are the Amaryllis, Christmas Cactus, Rosemary, Holly, and Mistletoe. They also have some special growing needs. One is an herb that you can enjoy and use in cooking. Learn more about them and what it takes to grow them. It is also important to know which of these plants can be poisonous to pets and children. Consider growing a Christmas Cactus as a houseplant project.

**Succulents, cactus** and other plants that need less sunlight are good ones for a houseplant project during winter. Possible choices are Aloe Vera, Jade Plant, Snake plants, Spider plants, Chinese evergreens or a Bromeliad. Be careful with houseplants in the winter. They can freeze easily. If you purchase or receive a houseplant to take home, protect them in a paper bag or box .

Consider what kind of Plant and Soils Project are you interested in doing this 4-H year? If houseplants aren't your interest, are you thinking of growing garden vegetables or flowers or both? Does your family grow grain crops? Will you be helping them with the crops? Or would you like someone to share growing a crop with you? Watch for more information in the January Newsletter.
